Interview with the PTC-SC 2010 Scholarship Winner, Eliana Ceja

In supporting and recognizing talented researchers in the field of I/O Psychology, PTC-SC offers an annual scholarship to current Master's level thesis students who are sole authors of research relevant to the scope of PTC-SC, whether completed empirical research, or preliminary results of a study in progress, including theses, dissertations, or other student papers that describe original research conducted by the author.

Graduate students were invited to participate in PTC-SC's 2nd Annual Scholarship Program. All qualified finalists received free admission to the annual PTC-SC Conference, on the condition that they present a poster on their research topic at the poster session.

The winner of PTC-SC's 2010 Scholarship Contest is Eliana Ceja. She defended her Master's thesis the day before the 2010 Annual PTC-SC Conference was held in Redondo Beach. Ms. Ceja will officially be awarded her Master's degree in December of this year. She is currently an intern at CODESP in Huntington Beach. PTC-SC VP Communications Amy Tompkins interviewed Ms. Ceja about the scholarship and her participation in PTC-SC.

PTC-SC: You're the winner of PTC-SC's 2010 scholarship competition. Congratulations! How did you learn about this contest, and why did you enter?

EC: I learned about it at one of the luncheon programs. PTC-SC offered a luncheon program that was free to students. I didn't know much about the organization, but I was curious, and it was free, so I attended. I met Amy Gurjian (Past President of PTC-SC) at the luncheon, and she told me about this competition. I wanted to submit work related to my thesis topic, but I wasn't sure if it would be interesting to PTC-SC members. So I discussed my thesis topic with Amy, and she was very encouraging. She urged me to submit my entry.

Of course, the cash prize was motivating! But I also wanted to find out how interested other people would be in my topic.

PTC-SC: Please describe your winning entry. What was your topic, and how did you choose it?

EC: I based the contest entry on my thesis work. The subject of my thesis was the impact of pay cuts both on the individuals who were subject to them, and on the organizations they worked in. I chose this topic for my thesis because I was personally familiar with the situation – both of my parents are school district employees – and was aware of the impact it had on people and on organizations.

For the research, I defined "resilience" in employees and in organizations, because I felt this was characteristic of people and organizations that dealt well with stressful actions like pay cuts. Some of the individual traits that contributed to resilience included emotional and financial stability, past experience with financial adversity, and problem solving skills.

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EC: Some of the organizational traits included good communications, trust in supervisors, and social support. The population I surveyed was comprised of actual employees of universities and school districts who were subject to pay cuts or furloughs.

PTC-SC: How do you think that your participation in the competition affected your research?

EC: It didn't affect my thesis directly, because I defended it the day before the conference! But I was very pleased with the level of interest in the topic that I found in people's reactions to the work at the conference. It certainly boosted my confidence in my work.

PTC-SC: So you are now a member of PTC-SC. What would you like to share about the benefits of belonging?

EC: As a student, I found it was a great networking opportunity. At the luncheon meetings, I had the chance to talk to all kinds of people, working in a wide range of areas related to personnel selection. And everyone I spoke with was so personable and helpful. The topics discussed ranged outside what we were studying in our classes, so that encouraged me to stay current with other research.

PTC-SC: One of our main focuses on the PTC-SC Board is increasing participation and membership among students and new graduates. From your experience with us, what advice can you give us on improving our outreach to these groups?

EC: Well, what first attracted me was the free luncheon meeting! I think that is a great way to attract students' attention. Students in our field might be familiar with the group's name, but they probably don't know exactly what PTC-SC does. I didn't at first, but when I began to attend the luncheons, I found the group's scope was much broader than I thought it was, and I wanted to continue to participate. It might help if our professors are encouraged to talk about PTC-SC to their students, too, so they can learn more about it.

I also think that offering free registration to the annual conference to competition participants is good outreach, because these are people who probably wouldn't attend the conference otherwise. I loved the conference and I had a lot of fun. The location was beautiful, and I met a lot of people to network with.
